Allen then identifies the medieval and neomedieval texts of *Seven Pillars of Wisdom* and shows why and to what effect Lawrence borrowed from chivalric, neochivalric, and pseudo-chivalric works, and sometimes transmogrified them, revealing Lawrence's greatest inspiration to be an English translation of the *Moallakat* (which is, so to speak, the Arabic *Beowulf*). Allen sheds new light on many aspects of the influence of medievalism on Lawrence's thought and writing.
