Using a variant of structuration theory, what Paul C. Mocombe calls phenomenological structuralism, this work explores and highlights how the African religion of Vodou and its ethic gave rise to the Haitian spirit of communism and the “counter-plantation system” (Jean Casimir’s term) in the provinces and mountains of Haiti.

This book offers both a philosophical and sociological model for understanding the constitution of identity in general, and black social identity in particular, without reverting to either a social or racial deterministic view of identity construction. Using a variant of structuration theory (phenomenological structuralism) this work, against contemporary postmodern and post-structural theories, seeks to offer a dialectical understanding of the constitution of black American and British life within the class division and social relations of production of the global capitalist world-system, while accounting for black social agency.

Space was not simply a passive backdrop to a social system that had structural origins elsewhere; it was vitally important for marking out and maintaining the hierarchy that sustained social and gender order in sixteenth- and seventeenth-century England.

Gender had a considerable influence on its use and organization; status and gender were displayed physically and spatially every moment of the day, from a person's place

at table to the bed on which he or she slept, in places of work and recreation, in dress, gesture and modes of address. Space was also the basis for the formation of gender identities which were constantly contested and restructured, as this book shows.

Examining in turn domestic, social and sacred spaces and the spatial division of labour in gender construction, the author demonstrates how these could shift, and with them the position and power of women. She shows that the ideological assumption that all women are subject to all men is flawed, and exposes the limitations of interpretations which rely on the model and binary opposition of public/private, male/female, to describe gender relations and their changes across the period, thus offering a much more complex and picture than has hitherto been perceived. The book will be essential reading not just for historians of the family and of women, but for all those studying early modern social history. This work analyzes the Protestant metaphysical origins and basis underlying the sociological process of globalization. Specifically, it outlines the different conceptions of globalization in the sociological literature, and then examines the nature of identity and identity politics in the age of globalization. The work concludes by drawing a connection between the nature of identity politics and the globalizing process.

A Depth Psychology Study of Immigration and Adaptation: The Migrant's Journey brings current academic research from a range of disciplines into a 12-stage model of human migration. Based on Joseph Campbell's hero's journey, this depth psychology model addresses pre-migration reasons for leaving, the ordeals of the journey and challenges of post-migration adaptation. Glücklicherweise, als jetzt beide Bände in der Einheit erscheinen können, die sie bilden. Aus einer Neuauflage wurde schließlich der vorliegende Band II von "Politische Theorien der Gegenwart". Aber nicht nur der Titel mußte neuen Entwicklungen angepasst werden. Auch die zeitgenössischen politischen Theorien entwickeln sich mit einer z.T. rasanten Geschwindigkeit weiter. Um im wahren Sinne des Wortes "gegenwärtig" zu bleiben, haben wir bei unseren Autoren eine inhaltliche Aktualisierung der ersten Auflage angeregt, die sehr freundlich aufgenommen wurde. Für die

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Aktualisierungen, die den Stand der theoretischen Debatte vom Herbst 2000 reflektieren, wurden nahezu alle Beiträge überarbeitet.

The transition to adulthood is a complex process, and college is pivotal to this experience. Dabei handelt es sich allerdings urn den wichtigsten und grundlegendsten Teil, ohne dessen Kenntnis eine Beurteilung der Theorie Parsons' iiberhaupt nicht moglich ist. Diesem Band wird in Kiirze ein zweiter folgen, der einige Beitrage Parsons zur Theorie der Interaktionsmedien sowie einen Beitrag von Niklas Luhmann zu diesem Thema enthalt (1). Die Herausgabe der beiden Bande zur Theorie der Sozialsysteme und der Theorie der Interaktionsmedien ist ein Versuch, die

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Auseinandersetzungen mit der gesellschaftlichen Systemtheorie (2) auf der Grundlagen ebene zu ergänzen. Dieses Buch und seine Einleitung wendet sich vor allem an Studenten und andere Leser, die Parsons noch nicht oder nur wenig kennen. Man könnte freilich - iiberspitzt - sagen, daß kaum jemand Parsons wirklich kennt. Einer der Hauptgründe dafür liegt in dem Umfang seiner Arbeiten, ein anderer in der Schwierigkeit jedes Versuchs, Parsons' theoretische Argumente im ersten Anlauf zu begreifen. Daher sind viele Argumente verkiirzt oder aufgrund von Rezeptionen aus zweiter oder dritter Hand zur Kenntnis genommen worden. Dabei haben sie sich mit zahlreichen Vorurteilen vermischt (3), so daß vielfach die bestehenden Kenntnisse über Parsons ein Konglomerat aus theoretischen und ideologischen Argumenten darstellen.

Two specific case studies, one in the United States and one in the United Kingdom, are utilized to demonstrate how contemporary educational emphasis on language and literacy parallels the organization of work and contributes to the debate on academic
