Pauline Shaw Bayne has cleanly organized the material in three succinct parts, allowing for three independent tracks of study. Part I treats essentials of the research process. It explains starting point resources like library catalogs, dictionaries, and

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bibliographies; addresses scholarly documentation, the use of style manuals, and basics of copyright; and provides samples of common written research products.
