

Thats Not My Lamb

From Torey Hayden, the number one Sunday Times bestselling author of *One Child* comes *Lost Girl*, a poignant and deeply moving account of a lost little girl and an extraordinary educational psychologist's courage and determination. Jessie is nine years old and looks like the perfect little girl, with red hair, green eyes and a beguiling smile. She even has a talent for drawing gorgeous and intricate pictures. Her parents say they can't take her back, and her social workers struggle to deal with her destructive behaviour and wild mood swings. Torey's gentle care and attention reveal shocking truths behind Jessie's lies. Can Torey and the other social workers help to provide the consistent loving care that has so far been missing in Jessie's life, or will she push them away too?

This is a sweet, touchy-feely book which is just right for sharing with babies and toddlers. The furry textures are a delight to touch, and even very young babies will reach out to touch them.
